I. Rules and Regulations

A. Divisions/Teams

- i. There will be 2 divisions: Middle School and High School.
 - a. The Middle School division will be comprised of students in the 6th – 9th grades.
 - b. The High School division will be comprised of students in the 9th – 12th grades.
- ii. Each team needs to have between 4 and 6 students.
 - a. Only 4 students will be competing at a time on a team.
 - b. Alternates can be substituted between rounds, but not during a match.
- iii. A student may only be on 1 team.
- iv. Each team shall have a uniform, matching colors, or be formally dressed.

B. Format

- i. This will be a double elimination tournament.
- ii. Questions will be divided into toss-up questions and bonus questions.
- iii. After a toss-up question is asked, members on each team have 10 seconds to “buzz” in.
 - a. The first person to “buzz” will be selected to answer the toss-up question.
 - b. The member will have 5 seconds to begin their answer.
 - c. If they get the answer correct, their team gets 10 points and a bonus question
 - d. If they get the answer wrong, their team loses 5 points and the question is repeated. A member of the opposing team can “buzz” and answer the question.
- iv. The bonus question can be discussed with the team, and the team captain provides the answer.
 - a. If they get the answer correct, their team gets 20 points.
 - b. If they get the answer wrong, no points are awarded, and the next toss-up question is asked.
- v. Only the first answer will be accepted.
- vi. The host may ask the contestant to clarify an answer. The clarified answer will be accepted.
